Why Alternative Programs?

- Providing families choices to meet the unique learning needs of each student
- Programs focus on a particular language, culture, subject (Arts, Science), or teaching philosophy
- Informed choice is essential what is THIS particular program about and how does it meet MY child's needs?





Key Messages

- Each program has unique features
- Integrity of the program remains the same across sites
- All sites follow Alberta Programs of Study with ATA certificated teachers
- All schools requiring a lottery follow the CBE lottery process
- Aligned with system timeframe for registration





Lottery Process


- Where a program is oversubscribed the lottery process will be employed
- Registrations are categorized using 3 priorities:
 - Priority 1 siblings in walk zone
 - Priority 2 walk zone, no siblings or outside walk zone with sibling
 - Priority 3 designated attendance area
- Notification of acceptance via letter or email by 10 business days after the lottery (March 1, 2021)





Timeline for Registration

- Opens January 11, 2021
- Closed noon on Tuesday before Teachers' Convention (February 9, 2021)
- Lottery drawn on Wednesday before Teachers' Convention (February 10, 2021)
- Results of the lottery draw sent within 10 business days of the draw (March 1, 2021)
- Parents must accept/decline within 10 days from the date of the acceptance letter





Characteristics of the TLC Program:

- character education
- whole group instruction
- academic enrichment (vertical and horizontal as appropriate and possible in the school setting)
- mandatory Music/Band until end of grade 9
- mandatory French as a Second Language from grade 1
- singing of O Canada daily
- mandatory school uniform
- TLC Program ends in Grade 9





Differences and similarities with community school programs:

Differences:

- gradual release of responsibility model
- character education program
- French from Grade 1
- Music/Band until end of Grade 9
- in middle school, with mandatory Band and French, students will not have access to as many other complementary courses
- costs associated with purchasing the uniform and fees associated with the Band program

- Second language opportunities
- daily PE

- Citizenship
- Personal Development






The TLC classroom:

The TLC classroom:

- utilizes the gradual release of responsibility model
- provides whole group instruction as primary approach
- academic enrichment both vertical and horizontal where appropriate and possible
- intentionally teaches and reinforces elements of a character education program
- has daily homework expectations in grades 1-9





A TLC student demonstrates...

- respect for self, others, and the environment
- self-management and organizational skills
- participation in positive social interactions and takes an active role when engaging in problem solving, acts of citizenship and service
- acceptance of a rigorous academic environment
- willingness to pursue excellence across all disciplines of the Alberta Programs of Study
- a willingness to work independently
- a commitment to daily homework





Transportation considerations

- Transportation for grades 6-9 may be offered through congregated yellow bus stops
- Transportation for grades 6-9 is offered through Calgary Transit (no rebates or fee waivers are provided)
- Parents pay an annual fee for CBE yellow bus service or purchase monthly Calgary Transit passes





Transportation considerations:

- Congregated stops are reviewed annually and informed by pre-registration for transportation, online through MyCBE
- Congregated stops may not be within walking distance and alternate arrangements may be required to access the congregated stop

Uniform Guidelines

School uniform colour: Middle School – navy (TLC cardigan & vest)

All students wear the TLC plaid. Either the plaid tie or kilt must be worn on formal days

Formal uniform is required on Mondays as well as on special assembly or occasion days as established by the school, but can be worn every day. Informal uniform may be worn on all other days.

All uniform pieces must be clean, tidy, in good repair and fit appropriately. All uniform pieces should be clearly and permanently labelled so that in the event that a piece is found it may be returned to the correct student.

Further information about purchasing is available when acceptance into TLC is confirmed and child is registered. Do NOT purchase a uniform until this time.

- TB Riley has approximately 623 students in grades 6-9
- Approximately 65% or 404 TLC Students and 35% or 218 students from our community






School Council for Parents

- Daily homework
- School uniform
- Costs associated with uniforms
- Band along with some options classes







1) Does my child get PE class every day? Answer – Yes PE class is scheduled every day and usually taught by the Grade 6 teachers. Students will be expected to change into PE gear (shoes, shorts/pants/shirt and student may purchase TBR attire if desired but not mandatory).



2) Does my child have to take French as a Second Language (FSL all year)? Answer – TLC has mandated that all schools meet a minimum of 95 hours of instruction for FSL and therefore students must take French until the minimum hours are met (March). After FSL is completed in March for the Grade 6 students, teachers will use the class time to teach Mathematics and Humanities. Grade 7-9 TLC students will take FSL as a full year course




- 3) Can my child try out for school sports? Answer Students in Grade 6-9 will be able to try out for all school sports. Depending on the sport and student interest, the school may have just one school team (6-9) or a junior (6-8) and senior (8-9) program.
- 4) Can my child leave campus during lunch? Answer Grade 6 students are not permitted to leave campus at any time during the day, unless they have approved parental consent to walk home for lunch. Students in Grade 7-9 have the option to stay or leave campus.











6) How much homework will my child have each day? Answer - Homework will be based on classroom instruction and personalization for students' needs. It will be meaningful and with the purpose of reinforcing classroom teachings and support students in the work of developing time management. organizational and study skills.



7) What changes can my child expect moving from an elementary school to a middle school?

Answer:

- Grade 6 students will have multiple teachers example (Math and Science, Humanties, Art, Band) and may require to travel throughout the school for Band, PE and Art class.
- Students will be assigned a locker for the personal items and school supplies (locks provided by school)
